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The program provides advanced study and practice in writing techniques and style, principles/techniques of editing, and the functions of written communication within the professional/occupational setting. Courses aim to develop the communication skills of people seeking to enter or to advance in occupations requiring extensive writing and/or the analysis and reporting of data. Students may choose from tracks in creative writing, journalistic writing, technical writing and scientific communication, teaching writing, and writing for the nonprofit sector. Students who would rather design their own route through the program may choose "no track."

Accelerated Bachelor's-Master's Program

Students may also earn credit toward an M.S. in Professional Writing through the Department of English's accelerated bachelor's to master's program. This program allows students to take graduate courses as undergraduates and have the units count toward both degrees. Prospective applicants should contact the program director for details.

Portfolio

All students in Professional Writing are required to complete a written master's degree portfolio as a qualifying exam. The portfolio must be submitted between completion of 12 to 18 units of degree work. If deemed unsatisfactory, the portfolio may be resubmitted once. A second failure results in dismissal from the program.
