ASIAN STUDIES CONCENTRATION -INTERDISCIPLINARY STUDIES MAJOR

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The Program

The Asian Studies Concentration within the Interdisciplinary Studies major is designed to offer students an interdisciplinary program of study of various dimensions of the Asian world. Students may plan a course of study that concentrates on a particular aspect of Asian civilization or on a particular sub-region of Asia. One might, for example, focus on the art and philosophy of various Asian peoples, or instead, one might concentrate on Chinese, Indian or Japanese civilization, studying both the traditional and modern society, its physical setting, and its political and economic development. In order to build a sound program of study, which meets both the individual student's needs and the Interdisciplinary Studies requirements, it is essential that students work closely with an adviser in planning the program and selecting courses.

Requirements For the Concentration

Students in the Asian Studies Concentration must complete a minimum of 45 units. In addition to ASST 201 (3 units) and 30 units of electives, 1 2 units of a foreign language are required (students may choose multiple languages; however, the recommendation is to concentrate on one language). The advisory committee may waive the language requirement for native speakers of Japanese, Chinese, Arabic, or Hebrew; however, the student must take 12 additional upper-level courses to meet the 45 total units required. Students may transfer up to 21 units toward the completion of the major.

Departmental Honors

The Asian Studies honors program allows undergraduates to develop their critical thinking and cultural expertise in a rigorous and collaborative environment. The program requires a two-semester sequence of independent study, the culmination of which is the writing of a senior honors thesis — a significant scholarly research paper prepared under the close supervision of a faculty member affiliated with Asian Studies. Students accepted to the honors program must take IDIS 498 Honors Directed Reading in Interdisciplinary Studies their first semester of the program and IDIS 499 Honors Thesis in Interdisciplinary Studies their second semester. Both courses may count towards the upper-level elective requirement for the concentration. Students who are interested in pursuing departmental honors should consult the Director of Asian Studies and reach out to an affiliated faculty member capable of supervising their honors thesis, upon reaching 75 units, or three semesters before their expected graduation.

Departmental Honors are designated on a graduate's transcript when a student successfully completes IDIS 498 Honors Directed Reading in Interdisciplinary Studies and IDIS 499 Honors Thesis in Interdisciplinary Studies. Students pursuing departmental honors are not required to be members of the Honors College. Departmental honors are distinct from Latin honors (e.g. cum laude) and from enrollment in the Honors College.
